### DEMOCRACY AND THE FIRST AMENDMENT

All people in a democracy have the right and responsibility to take part in the decisions that affect them and their communities. Freedom of speech is vital to a healthy democracy and is guaranteed in the First Amendment. CCTV provides the community with the opportunity for political, cultural, artistic, spiritual, and individual expression on television.

### COMMUNITY DECISION-MAKING

Freedom of expression alone is not enough to ensure a healthy democracy. Citizens must also enter into active discussion and debate in order to participate in solving problems for the common good. CCTV promotes the use of non-commercial Channels 21, 22 and 23, and its production facilities as an electronic forum for discussing issues and solving problems.

### **Access to Information**

A well informed, actively involved citizenry makes more responsible decisions. CCTV televises local government meetings, activities of local schools, and service-related information to stimulate an active dialogue among elected officials, schools and local citizens.

#### **DIVERSITY AND INCLUSIVENESS**

Democracy is most effective in a society in which all members can participate. CCTV encourages understanding and collaboration across barriers of race, culture, language, class, gender and age.

#### MEDIA LITERACY

Community TV offers an alternative to commercial television. CCTV provides the training and tools necessary for people to become knowledgeable and effective communicators able to view television critically and to use that medium to tell their own stories.

## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

## **B**UILDING OUR **V**ALUE

In the past two years, we've focused on providing more help to our community by adding a Community Facilitator position, modernizing our equipment and facilities, installing robotic camera systems at Salem and Marion County, and adding audio services and state music championship productions to our work.

CCTV hosted a successful Alliance for Community Media Northwest Regional Conference in April of 2001, inviting members from seven states and two Canadian Provinces. We also continued our tradition of production excellence by volunteers and staff in winning national and regional contest awards.

In April of 2001 we hired Julienne Turner as Community Facilitator, a position created to help members of the public complete their programs. Julie brought six years of experience, including staff time at Akaku in Maui, and a great deal of computer savvy plus a winning way with the public to CCTV.

One year later, original CCTV staff member and Training Coordinator Liz Schillinger left to teach in the Dallas public schools. We hired Greg Hiltz, who in 1991 was one of CCTV's first school age volunteers, trained by Liz. Greg brings production savvy, computer skills and his long-time experience and commitment to CCTV.

We made significant improvements to our equipment and facilities. Five robotic cameras now ease production of City of Salem and Marion County meetings, and allow complete coverage of budget committee work and special events. We put new cameras in our studio, along with a new switcher. We completed replacement of our dated titling systems with Inscribers, and then launched into non-linear editing with Apple G4s and Final Cut Pro.

CCTV continued to collect awards, reflecting the partnership of staff and volunteers. Recognized programs include:

the Salem Police Dept.'s Streetbeat; CCTV's Community Billboard Sprague High Schools' 1999 Grammy Award; Public Service Announcements for the Elsinore Theatre; CCTV Game of the Week and Game of the Week series; The 2002 Colors of Christmas, a multi-denominational holiday music fest sponsored by 19 local churches.

Encouraged by the enthusiasm, creativity and dedication of our volunteers, CCTV purchased new audio equipment and began to further serve schools by making high quality audio recordings of music performances. CCTV then formed a partnership with the Oregon Schools Activities Association that allowed CCTV to record state music competitions, long dominated by our local schools.

We look forward to meeting the needs of our community, hopefully in a new, larger location. We invite you to come see us.



This amount is based on an average of \$800 of labor and effort to create one hour of programming, including: \$450 value of talent, concept creation and scripting, producing and editing; and \$350 for crew work on production.

CCTV volunteers assisted local groups by helping produce community programs:

CCTV added \$368,000 of equipment between July of 2000 and June of 2002, with 80% of the purchases in the first year. A studio renovation and computers for titling, office use and non-linear editing comprised most of the expenses. With most of the modernization complete by late fall 2001, CCTV reduced capital expenditures to save for a move to a larger facility.

#### **CCTV REMODELS**

CCTV staff closed the facility for a month while staff painted and remodeled the edit rooms and the studio control room. Thanks to the forward looking team of Scott Hawley and Pat Henderson, CCTV made system improvements that will help all community producers have better looking and sounding programs. The improvements included:


- Inscriber, a new computer graphics software with modern titling capability installed in the linear tape editing systems and the minimobile unit:
- new and larger Echo Lab switchers in the studio and both edit rooms for a better signal;
- improved working conditions in the studio control room and edit rooms with track lighting and dark gray walls:
- expanded media library with 426 more copyright free music selections and 1700 sound effects:
- a new library of 140 animated motion backgrounds for program openings and closings;
- new curtains and a green screen for chroma keying were added in the studio;
- · a new paint job for the CCTV door and truck

## CITY OF SALEM & MARION COUNTY Installation Improvements

CCTV installed five robotic cameras at the Salem Council Chambers and the new Marion County conference room at Courthouse Square. The systems included specially equipped, remote control Panasonic cameras, digital VCRs, SVHS Echolab switchers and Inscriber titlers. These units enable CCTV to televise more activities in a less intrusive production environment. What a great way to improve and extend meeting coverage while relieving our volunteers of outside set up at Marion County and extended time standing behind cameras at both locations.

#### STUDIO UPGRADE

In the fall of 2000, CCTV replaced cameras installed nearly 10 years earlier for the studio opening in 1991. The new studio cameras, high quality JVC KYD29s, match truck cameras installed three years earlier, much to the satisfaction of studio producers. A new analog component switcher and Inscriber titler now make the studio CCTV's best production system.

#### DIGITAL UPGRADE

CCTV replaced all Apple office computers with G4s, which also serve as Final Cut Pro editing stations for staff and community producers.

CCTV began offering non-linear (computer-based) editing classes in the fall of 2001 and community producers happily embraced the technology. With the hiring of Julie Turner as Community Facilitator, CCTV created a Filmmakers' Workshop series which provided a support group for people wanting to produce a television program. The success of this program tells us that CCTV is heading in the right direction in empowering producers and creating volunteers.
